NOTE:

- For admittance into the major, an overall GPA of 2.50 is required.
- A GPA of 2.50 is also required for the four business courses to be taken prior to application to the major (BSE 2110, 2211, 2310, 2610). Additionally, students must earn a minimum grade of C- in each of these four courses.
- Calculus I requires a prerequisite of MATH 1150 or four years high school mathematics.
- Students planning to pursue graduate study in economics are advised to consult with their advisor and to plan additional courses in computer science, math and statistics.
- In order to take graduate (SBNM) courses students must have a 3.0 GPA and be in senior status. Students should refer to the catalog guidelines for undergraduate students taking graduate level courses.

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
