

HISTORY AND THEOLOGY OF THE EVANGELICAL COVENANT CHURCH

Purpose:

The purpose of this survey course is to assist students in gaining a deeper knowledge of and appreciation for the history of the Evangelical Covenant Church. This includes background in the Reformation tradition of Sweden and Europe, as well as the Free Church movements that influenced the revivals of the nineteenth century. The transplanted Swedish renewal to America by immigrants provides the more immediate context of the denomination's history. The course will also examine the theological roots and development of the Covenant's story into the twenty-first century and explore the meanings of that heritage for today. This intensive course is specifically designed for students in the SemConnect program.

Because of the size of the class, as well as the body of material that needs to be conveyed in such a short time, the normal format of the course will be lecture and discussion. Students are encouraged to raise pertinent questions in class arising from the readings and lectures. The primary emphases in the course are: the basic mastery of the assigned readings; the opportunity to engage in research and writing; and the ability to discern and articulate the relevance of the historical issues for the life of the church in the present.

Before the beginning of the class, students will be required to read *By One Spirit*, *Anatomy of the Pilgrim Experience*, and *Covenant Affirmations*. While at NPTS, there will be opportunity to read *Into One Body* and *Covenant Roots*, as well as review the pre-reading. With the one-week concentration of a three-credit course, **it is imperative that students complete all pre-class reading**. It will also make it possible for students to begin a research topic.

Written Assignments:

- A. Two written essay examinations, one in-class, one take-home.
- B. A research paper on some aspect of Covenant history and theology. Because of the compact character of the course, the topic needs to be manageable. The length should be 15 pages, exclusive of notes and bibliography.
This paper is due no later than February 25.
- C. A 3 page paper describing the student's perceptions of the "essence" of the ECC.
This paper is due before class, Tuesday, January 11.
