# Course meets prerequisite for the occupational therapy clinical program.

Occupational Therapy generally demands a Master's Degree in Occupational Therapy as the minimal professional degree. North Park University offers a pre-occupational therapy concentration that prepares students for entry into clinical master's degree programs in Occupational Therapy. Students may select any major [Biology and Psychology are the two majors most commonly selected by pre-OT students]; in addition to meeting the major requirements and general education requirements, students should complete the courses listed in the pre-OT program. The pre-occupational therapy program meets the prerequisite requirements of most clinical master's degree programs in Occupational Therapy, however students are urged to investigate programs that they are interested in to determine specific requirements for these programs. Entrance into clinical programs is competitive and selective. Acceptance to North Park or into a particular undergraduate major does not guarantee acceptance into any clinical program. Students must make separate application to clinical programs, usually late in their junior year. The application must include evidence that the student has completed all prerequisites, has obtained appropriate letters of recommendation, taken the GRE test, and has had experience in the clinical field [students are strongly encouraged to complete an occupational therapy internship during their study at North Park], and attained an acceptable GPA.

A student who desires to pursue Occupational Therapy should contact Dr. Linda Vick, Professor of Biology, for further information regarding Occupational Therapy early in their educational career.

Through affiliation with the Program in Occupational Therapy of the School of Medicine at Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri, a student can earn both a baccalaureate degree from North Park University and a Master of Science degree in Occupational Therapy from Washington University. This cooperative education program is a 5 year program. Students spend three years in residence at North Park, followed by two years in residence at Washington University. This is an especially focused and concentrated program that is suited for highly motivated, well-prepared, and academically strong students. Students who choose this program should plan to complete a biology major. Because this program requires a rigid academic program with no room for elective courses, any student interested in the 3/2 program should meet with Dr. Linda Vick early in their first semester at North Park.

- A Grade Point Average of at least a 3.0 is recommended to be a competitive applicant in the for entrance into a Masters of Science in occupational therapy program.
- Last 30 semester hours must be taken at North Park
- Acceptance into a major.
