- · No more than 12 hours in one discipline and no more than 8 hours can double count.
- · At least 4 courses must be at the 3000 level
- A final paper is required as part of the capstone course in which an issue is analyzed in the context of the two cultural regions studied. It is to be approximately 25 pages in length, read by the subcommittee of advisors, and presented at a forum attended by other Global Studies majors.
