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Course Description

A guided experience in expository preaching. The focus of the class will center on understanding how proper hermeneutics drive the sermon in order to produce a clear exegetical idea from the biblical text that lays the foundation for the development of the homiletical idea (Big Idea) for the sermon.

Learning Outcomes

As a result of this course, students will:

- Be able to articulate and apply within a sermon the Robinsonial theory of expository preaching
- Be able to demonstrate through accurate exegesis foundational principles in the area of hermeneutics and how these principles lay the foundation for good exegetical work within the biblical text.
- Be sensitive to the needs of the audience to whom the message is being delivered
- Do Big Idea preaching based on the detailed exegesis of the text
- Possess the skills to create a homiletical outline that is built upon the exegetical idea of the text.

Course Expectations and Requirements

I. Course Objectives

- To develop skills in analyzing a passage of scripture for the purpose of developing the exegetical idea from the text.
- To create a systematic approach in formulating the homiletical outline.
- To recognize the relationship between exeges is and homiletics.

- To build a foundation for proper sermon delivery.
- To develop the skills necessary to execute Perry's homiletical paradigm including the development of the Contextual Issues.

II. Course Expectations

- Each student must read all class texts in their entirety prior to the first day of class. A three to five-page reflection paper per text is due the first day of class on each text. The paper should address the following: Overall thesis of the book, what aspect of your philosophy and practice of preaching was influenced by the book, what are the two or three major takeaways that you will begin to integrate immediately as a result of reading this book. 100 points total for all four papers, 25 points per text. Due June 4, 2018
- Each student will complete four position papers: synthetic, historical, biographical, and theological.

70 points for each paper for a total of 280 points Due June 6, 2018

 Each student will preach a minimum of two sermons using the same text that will be assigned to them by the professor. Each sermon will be fifteen minutes.

Sermon outlines should be submitted in advance.

160 points for each sermon for a total of 320 points First outline due June 7, 2018 Second outline due June 8, 2018

• Each student will be responsible for "Creative Preaching Review" using the preaching evaluation form that will be passed out in class on the first day. Please listen to or read 3 sermons and provide reviews. You may listen to a sermon at your church or any other special meeting, preferably in a live audience.

60 points total or 20 points per sermon Due June 8, 2018

• 2 Quizzes will be given (Hermeneutics and Homiletics)

120 points for each quiz total 240 points Hermeneutics Quiz is on June 5, 2018 Homiletics Quiz is on June 6, 2018
