Honorary Degree Recipient Gary B. Walter

Reverend Gary Walter has served as President of the Evangelical Covenant Church (ECC) since 2008.

Walter grew up in Kentfield, CA, in the Bay Area, coming to faith through the ministry of Marin Covenant Church as a high school student. He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Journalism from the University of California, Berkeley, where he graduated with high honors. He received his Master of Divinity degree from North Park Theological Seminary.

He served Village Covenant Church, Azusa, CA; Newport Covenant Church, Bellevue, WA; and Clairemont Covenant Church, San Diego, CA prior to entering denominational service. Before becoming president, he served as the executive minister of the ECC's Department of Church Growth and Evangelism.

During his tenure as president, the ECC has continued to be a growing, multi-generational, multi-ethnic fellowship of churches, now with some 850 congregations in the United States and Canada, with ministry partnerships in dozens of countries around the world. He has guided the ECC to a new streamlined structure that brings focus to five priorities: start and strengthen churches, make and deepen disciples, develop leaders, love mercy do justice, and serve globally. He is a columnist for the *Covenant Companion* and serves on the executive committee of Christian Churches Together.

Gary and his wife Nancy are founding members of DeerGrove Covenant Church in Palatine, Illinois and have three daughters (Amy, Alissa, and Lauren) and three granddaughters.

A NOTE REGARDING ACADEMIC REGALIA

Today's academic costume is a legacy of the Middle Ages. In that period, the loose-fitting academic gowns, which today are merely decorative, served a useful purpose—keeping warm in the drafty and unheated stone buildings of the medieval university. Academic hoods were equally useful for keeping the head warm. But then, as now, clothing served not only practical purposes, but was also a way to define status. When the practical uses of academic garb were superseded by central heating, the symbolic use remained.

Most academic gowns in the United States today are black. The unadorned bachelor's gown is the simplest in design. The master's gown is somewhat more ample, with a peculiar half-sleeve. The doctoral gown is yet more generous of cut and distinguished by velvet facing and three velvet chevrons on the sleeve. The velvet may be black, or it may reflect the color of the wearer's degree. You will notice, however, that some faculty are more colorfully attired. These more splendid gowns have traditionally denoted degrees from European universities, where each institution prescribes its own regalia. In recent years, however, American institutions have increasingly departed from the somber black and adopted their own more colorful garb for doctoral degrees.

Academic hoods reflect both the wearer's degree by the size of the hood and the color of the velvet trim, and the institution from which the degree was earned. At North Park, hoods are worn by both graduates and faculty. The degree colors commonly found at North Park are:

The hood linings carry the colors of the school at which the degree was earned. For the graduates, the color is also reflected in the tassels. Some graduates are distinguished by gold cords worn around the neck. These are honor cords. One pair denotes honors (cumulative grade point average of 3.5 on a 4-point scale), and two pair denotes high honors (3.75).

The medallion traditionally worn by the President of the University contains the seal of North Park University and is the symbol of the presidential office. The Celtic Cross worn by the Dean of the Seminary was presented to him at his installation as a symbol of his office.

The order of precedence in academic processions generally places those of highest rank toward the rear. In order of procession, the degree recipients enter first, led by the marshal, banner bearer, and crucifer, followed in order by faculty, administrators, and board members, and finally the platform party. The opposite order prevails for the recessional.

These centuries old customs reflected in today's ceremonies remind us that while "commencement" points to the future, that which is now "commencing," it is also a culmination. Our resources for dealing with either the present or future are necessarily drawn from the accumulated store of wisdom that belongs to the ages and is by each generation discovered and reworked anew.
